

New Signage!





Signs no longer needed are being removed.

This was the scene in the early part of April as J. Hutchins, a contractor hired by VTrans, began work to install new signage on the MVRT.

The project involves improved signage on the trail as well as on roads at approaches to the MVRT. The Trail will have new mile markers like the one seen at left, new town boundary signs, directional and distance info signs, while the signage on roads at Trail approaches will be standardized. In some cases you will see mile markers at slightly different locations than they were previously. The distances are being remeasured to correct old positioning which over time got altered due to frost heaves and the difficulty of hand digging post holes in ballast.

Many thanks to VTrans for undertaking this project to improve the experience for MVRT users.

Updates Lamoille Valley Rail Trail

There will be some Trail construction this season!! Two portions of Phase 1 were put out to bid at the end of January. One part of Phase 1 is a 15-mile stretch from Mount Vernon Street in St. Johnsbury to Channel Drive in West Danville; the other part is a 17.5-mile stretch from Route 15A in Morrisville to Cambridge Junction. The construction of both parts was awarded to Munson Earthmoving of Williston at a total cost of \$2.7 million.

A bridge being erected just west of Morrisville is nearly complete.

Fundraising is an on-going endeavor as VAST is responsible for a 20% match of all federal grant funding for a total of \$3.5 million.

Richford Trail Extension

Plans continue in Richford to put in an extension of the Rail Trail. They are currently working on acquiring easements for the path which would run from Troy Street (across from the end of the MVRT) to the Sunoco station on Main Street. The path would be paved and is expected to be completed this construction season. The project is being funded by a grant from the Vermont Bicycle and Pedestrian program.
